Dear Friends of FACT and the Glendive Dinosaur & Fossil Museum,

"Test everything; hold fast what is good." I Thessalonians 5:21

In our last newsletter, we mentioned that one of our newest exhibits contains a juvenile Maiasaura cast, an adult Maiasaura model and an egg nest, all in a flood context. Many dinosaur eggs have been found throughout the world, and many explanations exist about how they could be preserved so perfectly.

However, since many reptiles either bury their eggs or cover them with vegetation, one would expect to find corresponding evidence with these dinosaur eggs, but little exists to suggest they were either buried or covered. So what's the reason for this apparent contradiction? Creation researcher Michael Oard has proposed the following explanation:

The only viable conclusion is that the dinosaurs laid their eggs in haste. They did not have time to dig a hole or add vegetation, possibly because there was no vegetation to be found. This means the eggs were laid in an unnatural environment and on flat sediment surfaces with subsequent rapid burial by watery flows—worldwide. In fact, the Argentina eggs are interpreted as resulting from multiple and successive flooding events.

Dinosaur eggs thus provide strong evidence for the BEDS (Briefly Exposed Diluvial Sediments) hypothesis—in which Flood sediments are briefly exposed during a local drop in the Flood water. This had to happen in the first part of the Flood since eggs and tracks indicate the actions of live dinosaurs, whereas by Day 150 all the dinosaurs would have been dead. Dinosaurs either swimming, clinging to log mats, or on higher land nearby could have embarked on the exposed sediments. They could make tracks, quickly lay eggs, and scavenge dead dinosaurs. A subsequent rapid rise in the muddy water of the Flood would then have covered up the dinosaur material and preserved it to this day.¹

As Michael Oard himself would attest, this may or may not be the right explanation. Scientific models or theories used to explain historical events always need to be tested. However, as Mr. Oard would also affirm, every model should be compared to the biblical record *first* and then be assessed against other possible scenarios.

When Paul and Silas preached in Berea, they described the Bereans as "noble," because they searched the Scriptures to see if what Paul and Silas said was true. May we be just as noble as we seek the truth about the origin and history of our world!
